 - o Local numbers vary by county staff must confirm county-specific CPS hotline
- Elder/Adult Abuse: California Adult Protective Services (APS)
 - o General Hotline: 833-401-0832 (automatically routes by zip code)
- Animal Abuse/Neglect:
 - Local SPCA, Humane Society, or County Animal Control
 - o State law mandates veterinarians and encourages others to report cruelty
 - o Emergencies: 911

General Guidelines for Staff

- 1. Immediate Danger \rightarrow Call 911
- 2. Reasonable Suspicion is Enough You do not need proof.
- 3. **Report Directly** Do not delegate; each staff member is responsible.
- 4. **Document** Record the date, time, agency contacted, and summary of what was reported in the client's confidential file.
- 5. **Notify Supervisor** Inform your supervisor after the report has been filed (do not delay reporting to do this).

Mandated Reporting Decision Tree

Step 1: Identify Concern

- Do you know of, suspect, or reasonably believe abuse/neglect has occurred?
 - If Yes → Go to Step 2
 - If No → Document concern in case notes; continue monitoring

Step 2: What Type of Abuse?

1. Child Abuse/Neglect

- 2. Elder/Dependent Adult Abuse
 - o Ohio: County Adult Protective Services (855-642-4453)
 - Kentucky: 877-597-2331
 - o Texas: **800-252-5400**
 - o California: 833-401-0832 (routes by zip code)
- 3. **Animal Abuse/Neglect** (where required by state law, or strongly encouraged)
 - o Contact Local Animal Control, Humane Society, or Law Enforcement
 - o In emergencies: 911
- 4. Imminent Harm (self or others)
 - o Call 911 immediately

Step 3: Reporting Action

- Call the appropriate hotline immediately (do not delay).
- ✓ Provide all known details: names, addresses, incident description, risk factors.
- ✓ Document in client file:
 - Date & time of report
 - Agency contacted & name of representative
 - Summary of concern

Step 4: After the Report

- Inform your **Supervisor/CEO** (do not delay the report to do this).
- Continue providing services to the client in accordance with safety guidelines.
- Participate in any follow-up requested by authorities.

* Key Reminders

- Reasonable suspicion is enough you don't need proof.
- **Do not investigate** on your own.
- Good faith reporters are protected from liability.
- Failure to report may result in disciplinary action, loss of licensure, and legal consequences.
